GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

Students will need the following to graduate:

- 80 credits
 - Must be grade 10, 11, or 12 level courses
 - Each course is 4 credits
 - Totaling 20 courses
- 80 credits includes <u>required</u> courses and <u>elective</u> courses (a minimum of 4 courses (16 credits) at the Grade 12 level including English 12)
- Three Provincial Graduation Assessments (a few times a year):
 - Grade 10 Numeracy Assessment (GNA 10)
 - Grade 10 Literacy Assessment (GLA 10)
 - Grade 12 Literary Assessment (GLA 12)
- <u>Indigenous Education Requirement</u> all students will be required to complete 4 credits of a Indigenous Focused course for graduation





Information from CLC Team

Volunteering Hours within SLSS (with restrictions)

• For graduation, according to the BC Ministry of Education, students must complete a minimum of 30 hours of volunteering. The CLC Team supports students in counting school volunteering hours, with specific guidelines in place. Here are the 3 key restrictions:


The 30-hour requirement must be completed during GRADE 10 to GRADE 12. (CLE 10 does not start until Sept of Grade 10.)

Hours spent in general or executive club meetings WILL NOT BE COUNTED towards volunteering hours. (Volunteer hours should be dedicated to community service.)

Career-Life
Exploration/Volunteering can include paid/unpaid experiences.

Consider completing your minimum 30 hours ahead of time to enjoy a stress-free volunteering experience thereafter. Post-secondary institutions and many companies **highly value** the volunteering experiences of young adults. (Some of them prefer to see 100+ volunteering hours.)






